

# Husker Trackmen Leave Tonight for First Missouri Valley Indoor Meet

## Coach Schulte Takes 16 Men to Kansas City

### Oklahoma Only School in Conference Which Will Not Be Represented in Meet.

Lincoln, March 23.—Coach Henry F. Schulte and his Husker tracksters left for Kansas City last night to compete in the Missouri Valley conference indoor meet Saturday night. Sixteen men were taken on the trip.

The Huskers cleaned up last spring in the valley outdoor meet, winning the championship of the conference for the first time in the 14 years which has seen Husker competition in this event.

The first indoor valley meet will see eight of the nine institutions in the conference listed on the program. Oklahoma, the only institution that will not be represented, is handicapped by the lack of training facilities which would enable it to put men into the meet.

Coach Schulte has been putting his tracksters over the board track for weeks preparing for the meet. The Huskers are in fine shape and will make a good showing in the indoor events.

The College of Medicine at Omaha will be represented by several veterans of the cinder path, including E. V. Allen, R. Fischer, E. F. Slemmons, David Deering and W. D. Lear.

### Pitcher Jelsma Is Hit Hard by Texans—Southpaw Shows Well in Five Innings in Box.

Victoria, Tex., March 23.—(Special.)—The Houston Buffaloes made a good start toward avenging their two defeats by Omaha last Saturday and Sunday, by winning the first game played here by a score of 5 to 0.

Smarting under the sting of a 2 to 1 defeat by the Texas A. and M. team, the Houston players came to Victoria with blood in their eyes and played unbeatable ball behind their two pitchers, Donalds and Fuller.

Their fielding bordered on the sensational on more than one occasion while the defense put up by the Omaha team was only mediocre.

Houston hammered Jelsma hard and Manager Burch yanked him at the end of the fourth inning with four runs against him. Drugmond, a southpaw, relieved him and pitched good ball, holding the Houstonians in check and allowing no earned runs, the final Houston tally being the result of an error by the Omaha infield. Although Omaha nicked Fuller and Donalds for six hits, as many as Houston got off Jelsma and Drugmond, they were scattered, Omaha had nine men stranded on bases.

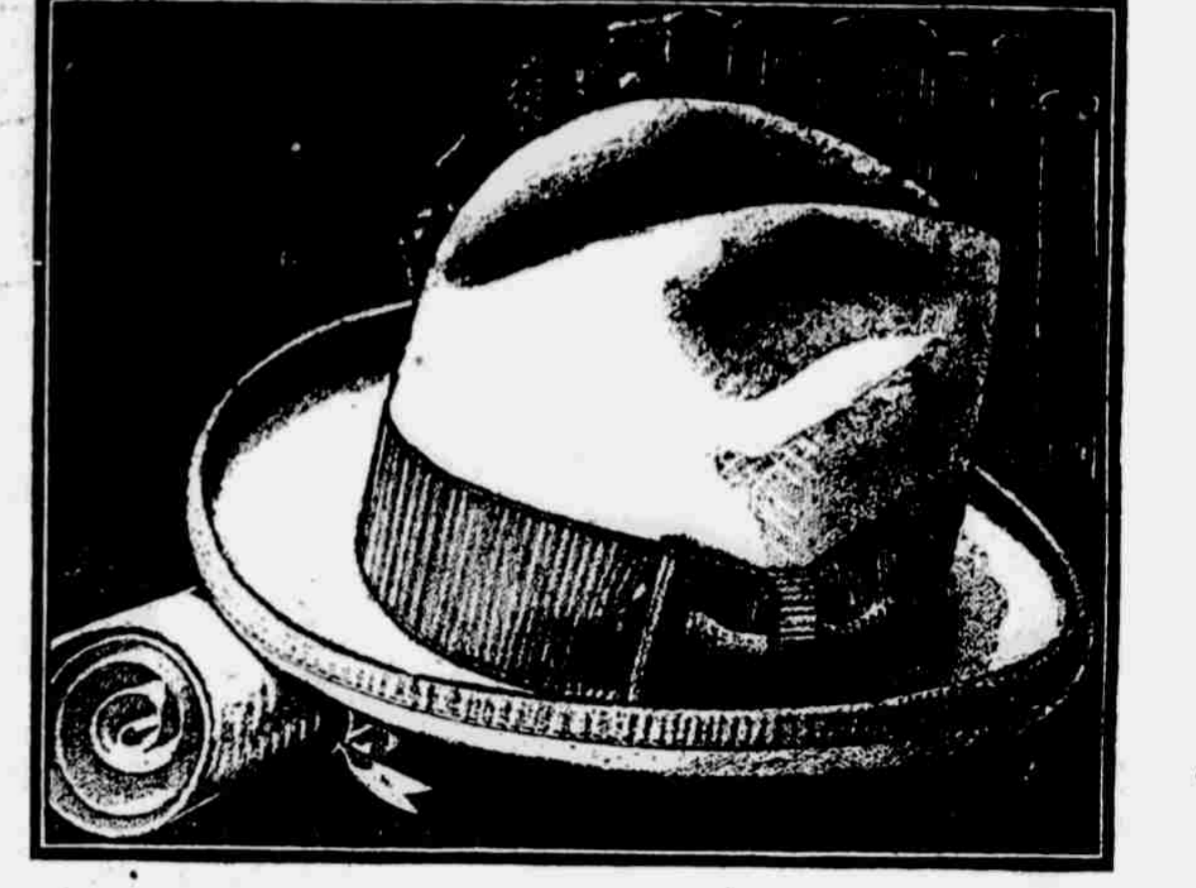
