Remarkable Results Reported From Nuradium in Energizing the System and Driving Out Disease Where Other Methods Had Utterly Failed.

First, the slice or piece of halibut is tied in a piece of cheesecloth. It is then plunged into a pot of boiling water to which a spoonful of lemon juice or vinegar is added. It is boiled until the flesh becomes white and opaque. One or two-inch slices require about 20 minutes.

The fish should then be removed from the cloth and skin and bones carefully taken out. Wrapping if h a cloth facilitates handling and also keeps the fish white. The lemon juice has a tendency to harden the flesh of the fish.

Place the prepared fish in a baking dish and cover it with a rich white sauce. For a pound of fish, allow one measuring cup of sauce. Rub together in a saucepan two level tablespoons each of flour and butter until none of the white flucting its visible. Add one cup of rich milk. Part of the milk may be comitted and rich cream substituted. Cook, stirring until the sauce boils and thickens. If it is lumpy, strain it.
