

### Veterans of Civil War Have Left Great Heritage

Older Patriots Pointed to as Example for Younger Generation at Meeting of G. A. R. Post.

Veterans of the civil war have left a heritage to the younger generation which will not be appreciated until it, too, has had many of the bitter experiences the veterans have experienced. Rev. J. P. Poucher told members of Old Guard post, No. 7, G. A. R., in an open meeting of the post held yesterday afternoon in the courthouse.

"These veterans prize the liberties and rights they have under the flag they sustained during the rebellion," Rev. Mr. Poucher said, "and knowing that they gave of their life's blood for the preservation of those liberties, they will not see them trampled upon."

Pointed to as Example. "It is to the younger generation to take these veterans as an example, to profit by their experiences and to begin at once to have a deeper appreciation of what it means to be an American citizen."

"Many of the younger generation are veterans of a great war. Their heroic deeds are too near to them to be properly realized. As it grows older and the magnitudes of the deeds become plainer, this generation, too, will know that love of country that comes after great sacrifices have been made."

### Babe With Broken Neck to Recover

Daughter of Former Omaha Girl Plays About Home Despite Plaster Cast.

Los Angeles doctors are watching with interest the case of Barbara Jean Stratford, 14 months old, who is recovering from a broken neck which she suffered in a fall from a divan on February 26. The case is remarkable and almost without precedent in the experience of physicians, they say.

Although the child, has her neck encased in a cast which she will probably have to wear for five or six weeks, she is lively and able to play about her home and attending physicians have assured her parents there is absolutely nothing to fear now.

There are no signs of paralysis and the child's complete recovery is assured, they assert. Barbara Jean is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Stratford, living at "Clement" a suburb of Los Angeles. Mrs. Stratford was formerly Miss Helen Patterson of Omaha, daughter of George D. Patterson, Omaha superintendent of the American Railway Express company. Mrs. Patterson left last night for Los Angeles to spend a month with her daughter and the children. Mr. and Mrs. Patterson have been in constant communication with their daughter since the accident.
