Forward North Omaha Show to Open This Week

Second Annual Exposition
Will Be Held in Imperial
Sash and Door Plant on
Boulevard.

The second annual Forward North
Omaha exposition will open Monday
evening at 6:30 in the plant of the
Imperial Sash and Door company, on
Florence boulevard at the Bell Lane.

The exposition will be open each
evening during the week. It will
occupy the entire north half of the
sash and door works.

North Side manufacturers, whole-
salers and retailers have devoted
much time to the preparation of this
display and feel they have succeeded
in arranging an exhibit that will
please the public.

Last year more than 40,000 per-
sons attended the first display of
that nature ever held in the north
section of the city. This year's plans
include arrangements to accommo-
date at least 50 per more specta-
tors than last year. There are twice
as many exhibitors in this year's
show than there were in the first
exposition.

The exposition is held under the
auspices of the North Omaha Activities
association, an organization of the
business interests of that section
of Omaha. They have a member-
ship of about 300 and meet once a
month as guests of the different
members at their establishments.

50-Foot Petition Urges Street Car Line Change

A petition 50 feet long, bearing
nearly 1,000 signatures, was displayed
in city council meeting yesterday
by Charles H. Cady, Thomas P.
Reynolds, O. A. Scott, C. H.
Schlotfeld, A. W. Bonner, R. J. Saun-
ders and M. L. Endres, representing
the North Omaha Activities associa-
tion, the Sherman Avenue Improve-
ment club and the Kountze Place
Improvement club, asking approval
of the street car company plan to move
the Sherman avenue car line tracks
from Seventeenth street to Sixteenth
street between Cass and Clark
streets.

This petition will be presented
formally to the council Tuesday
morning, they stated. Commis-
sioner Koutsky informed the exect
the council would take no action in
the case, that he has issued a per-
mit from his department for the pro-
posed change and that any move now
must be made by a resident of the
vicinity.

Ouster Suit Against Son and His Wife Dismissed

Judge A. E. Baldwin, in municipal
court yesterday morning, dismissed
for want of jurisdiction an action
brought by George W. Smith, 2422
North Twenty-second street, against
Wyllis and Grace Smith, 4902 Mil-
itary avenue, son and daughter-in-
law of the plaintiff.

The elder Mr. Smith sought to re-
cover possession of the Military ave-
nue premises which have been occu-
ped by defendants for nearly five
years under an oral arrangement
with the "tenancy at will" in law,
according to counsel for plaintiff.

The judge held that, inasmuch as
the case involved determination of
title, the municipal court was with-
out jurisdiction.

George W. Smith said he had no
thought or intention of giving the
property to his son and daughter-in-
law.

Diagram of Pawnshop to Be Used in Trial of Otto Cole

Chief Deputy County Attorney
Ray T. Coffey, accompanied by De-
tective William Gurnett, obtained
pictures and a diagram of the Hahn
pawnshop to be used in the trial of
Otto Cole, charged with the murder
of Henry Hahn.

Gurnett, who is personally inves-
tigating the case, has checked every
movement of Cole since he came to
Omaha.

About 27 witnesses have been
subpoenaed at the trial, which will
be held within two weeks.

suit brought by Palmer against
Election Commissioner W. D. Mc-
Hugh. The commissioner had re-
fused to accept Palmer's filing for
county commissioner from the
Fourth district, on the ground that
Palmer lives in the First district.

The county commission changed
the districts several months ago, thus
placing Palmer's residence in the
Fourth district.

Former Head of Biology at Bellevue College Dies

Dr. A. A. Tyler, for 15 years head
of the biological department at Bel-
levue college and three years dean of
the faculty, died of pneumonia Fri-
day night at Decatur, Ill., where he
has been in charge of the biological de-
partment of James Milliken univer-
sity since 1916.

Dr. Tyler was instrumental in
forming the Fontenelle Forest Re-
creation association and was its secre-
tary until leaving Bellevue. He is
survived by his widow and one child.

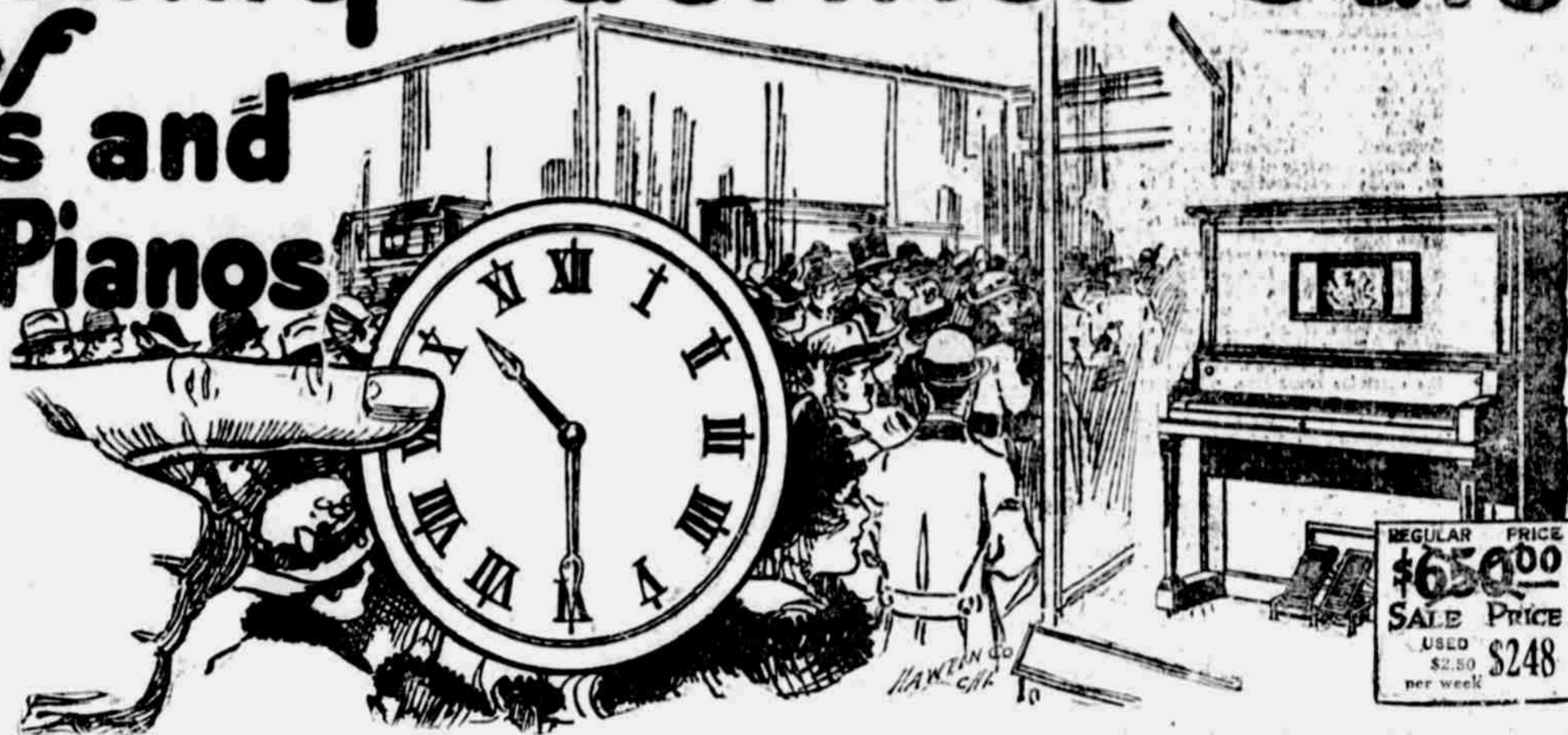
Journalism 1 Class Will Edit Central High Paper
