Pay as We Go Plan for Government

Campaign for Funds to Assistant Secretary of Treasury Says Only One Way to Maintain Financial Position of Nation.

Washington, April I.—Necessity of a pay "as we go" policy of govern-ment finance was urged by Eliot Wadsworth, assistant secretary of the treasury in charge of foreign loans, in an address before the Washington stock exchange, such a policy only, he declared, could the country maintain its position a the soundest financially in the world No matter how much the costs roll up, he asserted, income should be available to meet these costs. Money, be added, can be obtained from only one ultimate source which is taxes. direct or indirect, but in the end coming out of the pockets of the

"Our federal budget this year will practically balance," said Mr. Wads-worth, "Next year the estimates show a deficit. We are carrying interest charges and other expenses resulting from the war, which can-not be reduced. We are meeting a debt of honor to our disabled soldiers and sailors at a cost of \$450,-000,000 a year. No one grudges one cent of what we may wisely spend to make life prosperous and happy

for those men, "Other expenses will arise from the war. Perhaps you may have heard some talk of a bonus in the past few weeks. If paid, it will clearly be a war expense, but will not necessarily liquidate the war. There are today 60 widows of the war of 1812, and 2,000 widows of the Mexican was on our pension roll. Our last great war is 50 years in the past and our annual pension bill is \$250,000,000. Who would dare to estimate the ultimate cost to this country of the world war?"

ney streets. Once "Corncrib of Europe." The Central States Volga Relief ciety, with headquarters in Lincoln, was founded early in September, 1921, to alleviate suffering in the famine district of the Volga

This particular part of Russia was once the "cornerib of Europe." The people there are industrious and thrifty and before the war were prominent factors in the production of all kinds of grain to help feed the 1,700,000,000 human beings in the world. But war, revolution and bolshevism brought them to their present condition.

The Central States society has two representatives in Russia, Rev. Jacob Wagner of Portland, Ore., and George Repp of Lincoln, Neb., and the various Volga societies already have forwarded more than \$200,000 to Russia through the American Relief administration, which is sufficient only to keep the sufferers alive for one month on the basis of 96 cents sustaining one person one month. Mr. Eichhorn from Messer, one of a thousand towns in the Volga district, "who receive their nourishment in the American kitchens here, send with tears of thankfulness a thousand greetings to you, compassionate America, across the wide ocean; while the other 300 children who as yet are not being fed by your rep resentatives are longing for your relief: they, too, stretch their emaciated hands toward heaven for




