

### Women Doctors Want Medical Co-Education

#### Attack Decision of London Hospital Authorities Against Further Admission of Women Students.

London, April 1.—Medical co-education in England is in a precarious position as the result of the decision of London hospital authorities to refuse further admission to women students.

Women doctors are up in arms and threaten to fight the decision to the bitter end. They assert the step is due to antagonism on the part of men physicians, who are jealous of the progress made by the fair sex in the profession.

Lord Knutsford, chairman of the hospital responsible for the drastic decision, declares that the medical staff advised it because of the difficulties which arise in a mixed school of men and women students. He denied they objected to the medical education of women.

"There are unpleasant subjects which have to be taught to all who wish to take up medicine," he told the "Universal Service." "To teach these unpleasant but necessary things to either sex alone is possible, but the hospital staff have found difficulty in teaching those things to a mixed audience and do not wish to continue to do so. Minor difficulties have also to be met, and for those reasons the committee consider that we should revert to the old custom of training men only."

Women physicians who are taking up the gage of battle—and they number among themselves the most prominent women doctors in the world—point to the success of medical co-education in the United States and declare the decision is in every way unjust.

Dr. Flora Murray, one of the best known women practitioners in Europe, is emphatic in her protest. "It is not a fact that doctors find difficulty in lecture to mixed audiences," she declares emphatically. "Beneath this excuse is a growing opposition on the part of men in the medical profession to women doctors, who are steadily increasing in numbers. It is because their own supremacy is threatened."

Dr. Louisa Garrett Anderson, one of the first qualified women physicians in England, was equally positive in her assertion that jealousy is the underlying cause of the movement.

"It is a matter of fact," she said, "the policy of the London hospital is dictated by the jealousy of men on the staff against women going into medicine."

"During the war it was convenient for the hospitals to have women. Now they have enough men students it is a trouble for them and they are turning women out."

The male hospitals in England, which threw open their doors to women during the war, are now closing and will gradually close to women.

"If scientific subjects are taught in a scientific manner, there is not one which cannot be taught without the slightest difficulty to students of both sexes. That is not the real reason for the step. It is put forward as a blind. The real reason is the jealousy of the younger medical staff at male hospitals."

"The decision is unfair and unjust," declared Dr. Sloan Chesser. "It sounds prewar. We did not hear anything about the unpleasant subjects during the war when students had to do so much in the hospitals. A woman is a better wife and mother by reason of a medical education."

Neutral observers of the battle declare that the medical profession is on the verge of a sex war. Women throughout the country are asking this question as a result of Lord Knutsford's announcement. United action is bound to result when the women physicians band to combat the decision.

Several hospitals in Greater London are not inclined to agree with the London hospitals' drastic move. However, women medical students will still be admitted to Charing Cross hospital, University college, King's college, Westminster and St. Mary hospital. St. Bartholemew's, Guy's and the Middlesex hospitals do not provide for women students.

"We were the first hospital in London to adopt co-education," declares the secretary of Charing Cross hospital. "The system has worked excellently. Our men and women students take classes together, including mid-wifery and obstetrics. A professor who cannot lecture on medicine at this location is not worthy of his name."

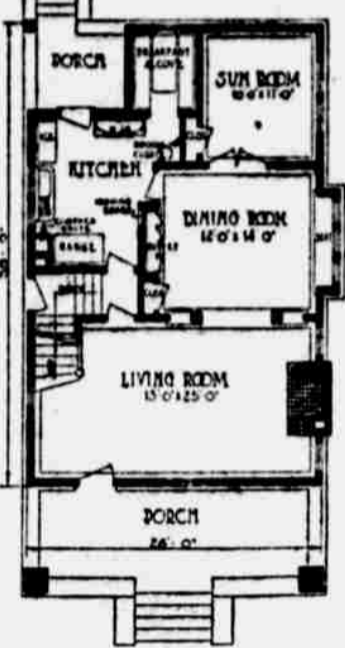
#### Buck Mercantile Company Leases Dodge Street Store

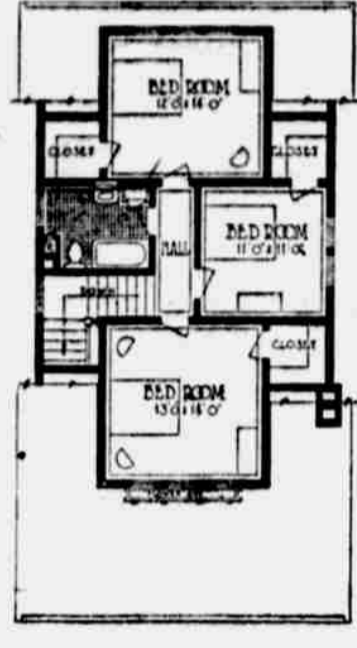

## New Apartments to Be Ready May 1

### Alhambra and Austin Opened for Inspection of Prospective Tenants.
