A large body of Sinn Feiners en-tered the postoffice at Sligo today and took possession of all depart-ments of the office in the name of the Irish republican army. They gave instruction that business was to proceed as usual, and left a party to see that these orders were carried out.

Early today a strong party of Free Staters arrived at Sligo in an ar-mored car and took possession of the county jail. Later armed republican troops took over the Victoria hotel, which was previously used as a military barracks; the town hall and the Guild hall, in addition to the postoffice. These buildings, together with the barracks recently evacuated by the constabulary, now are occu-pied by armed garrisons.

President Strikes at Little Navy

Harding Tells Congress He Considers 86,000 Minimum of Enlisted Strength Under 5-5-3 Terms Plan.

Opposes Party Leaders

Washington, April 14.-President Harding today dealt a crushing and

faction in the house. Intervening openly for the first time in the fight over the naval appropriation bill, the president told congress, in a letter to Representative Longworth, Ohio, that he considered 86,000 men the irreducible minimum of calisted strength for the American navy under the terms

In taking this position, President Harding was forced to assume an attitude of direct opposition to some of the most powerful of his own party leaders in the house, including Representative Mondell, Wyoming, republican leader; Representative Madden, Illinois, chairman of the appropriations committee, and Representative Kelley, Michigan, chair-tean of the naval subcommittee which draited the navy bill.

Advocate Small Force. They have been advocating the bill providing only 67,000 enlisted men for the eavy and have vigorcusly resisted claims of the Navy department that more men were necessary to maintain the navy. Up to a day or two ago it seemed probable that they would win. President Harding's letter, following closely upon a similar appeal by Secretary of State Hughes, is believed to have definitely turned the tide against the "little navy" move-ment and assured victory for the McArthur amendment for 86,000 en-

The president's letter, sprung suddenly by Representative Longworth in the midst of debate, received an enthusiastic reception. Although there had been rumors that the presi-dent would take a hand in the fight. the actual presentation of the letter was something of a surprise.
