Schabinger will assume his new position August 15. At the present time he is serving as athletic director of the Kansas State Normal school at Emporia.

Asset to Creighton. The employment of Schabinger to Creighton has added considerable prestige to Creighton's standing among Missouri valley schools.

His record in the last three years at the Kansas normal has been more brilliant. His specialty is basketball and track.

Section four, paragraph six, covering contracts and forfeitures of the Kansas state boxing law, is as follows:

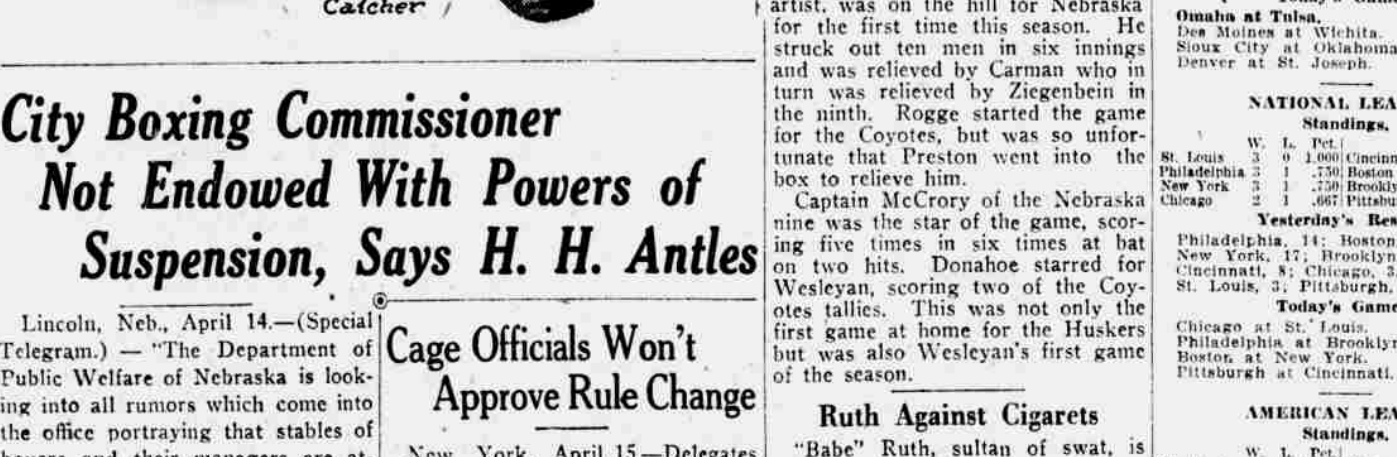
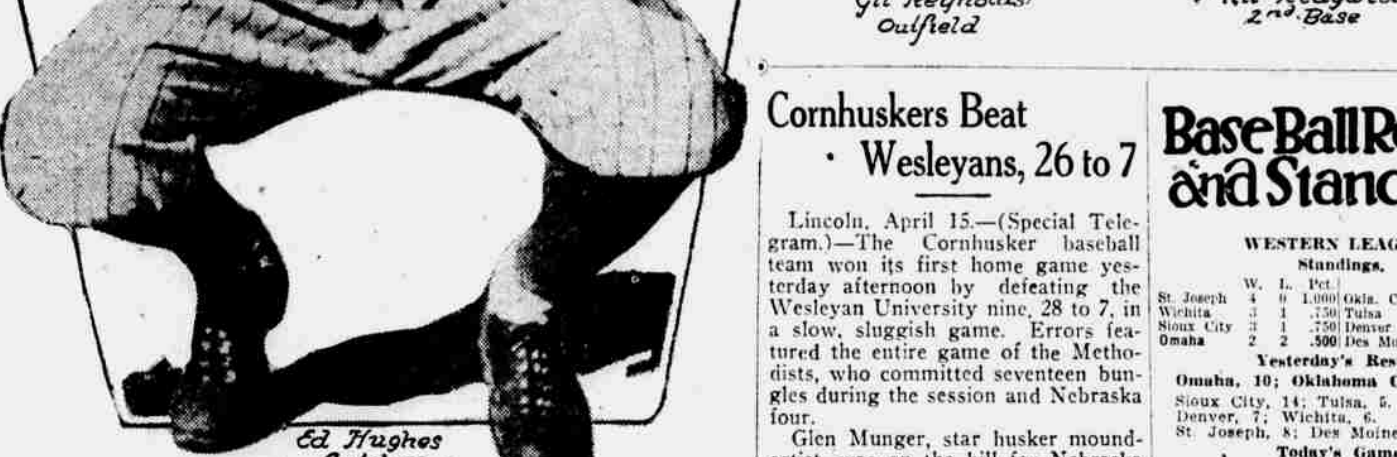
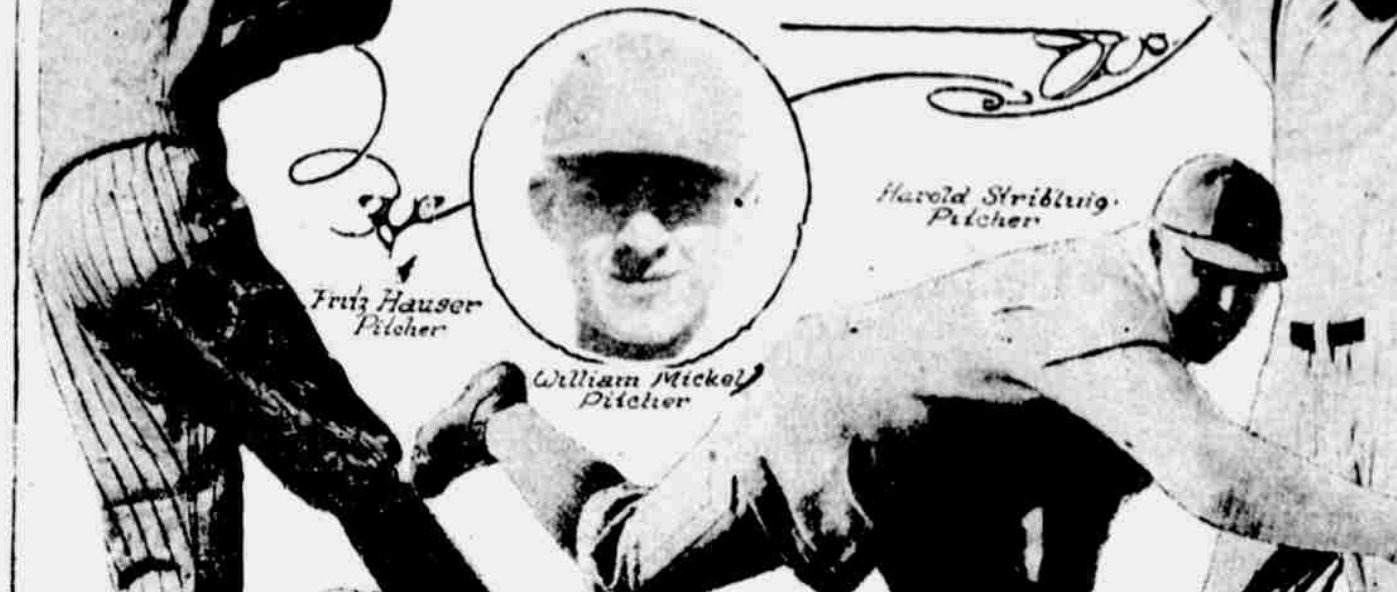
"Any club which shall, without sufficient reason, violate or break any contract entered into with any contestant, or whose license is cancelled or suspended."

City Boxing Commissioner Not Endowed With Powers of Suspension, Says H. H. Antles

Lincoln, Neb., April 14.—(Special Telegram.)—"The Department of Public Welfare of Nebraska is looking into all rumors which come into the office portraying that stables of boxers and their managers are attempting to schedule dates for too long a period of time in high position to work one man up to a high position as a drawing card," said Secretary H. H. Antles tonight.

Stories without any foundation that stables of boxers under management of men in close connection with one another injure the boxing game in Nebraska, in the opinion of Mr. Antles.

A rumor coming out of Omaha to the effect that "Bobby" Evans of that city had been suspended or barred by Inspector Kilmartin of Omaha is without foundation, according to Secretary Antles.

"In the first place," continued Mr. Antles, "Evans is not licensed in this state as a manager. He received a permit to act as a second at one bout and that is the extent of his activities so far as the department is concerned."

Furthermore, Inspector John Kilmartin of Omaha is not endowed with powers of suspension, and all such matters must go through the hands of the head of the department. Evidently this report is based on mere hearsay.
