

Golf Facts Worth Knowing

Q. Is there any rule in golf that prohibits the use of any cub except the putter on the putting green?

A. Certainly not. You can putt with your driver or nibilek, if you care to.
Q. Cen you tell me what the objections are on part of the United States Golf association to allowing mud which sticks to the ball to be removed?

A. The chief objection is to prevent any more touching of the ball with the hands than is absolutely necessary, when once it is put in play. Space is too limited here to attempt any detailed dincussion.

A. Not if a period of five minutes has clapsed since he began looking for the ball.

Q. In a medal qualifying round can a player who is away rompel his competitor to life or play his ball?

A. Tes, refusal to do so on part of the competitor disqualifies him.




