

Nebraska to Get First State Rally of G.O.P., May 11

W. J. Graham, Illinois Congressman, to Tell Lincoln Gathering of Party Achievements.

Washington, April 25.—(Special Telegram.)—The first state-wide rally of republicans in the present campaign is to be held at Lincoln May 11 and will be addressed by Representative William J. Graham of Illinois, Representative McLaughlin today wired C. A. McCloud of York, republican state chairman, of Mr. Graham's acceptance of the invitation.

The Illinois member was chairman of the committee that investigated war expenditures and is well acquainted with the Nebraska delegation through the service of Representatives Reavis and Jeffers on that committee. He will talk on conditions as the administration found them when it took office and its achievements since.

The erection of new rifle butts at the Ashland range by the government was practically completed as a result of a conference held this morning between War department officials and Col. H. J. Paul, adjutant-general of the Nebraska National guard. An engineer will be sent soon to look over the ground. The new construction of concrete and steel will cost around \$20,000.

Governor McKelvie spoke this morning before the Farmland club, an organization of agricultural press representatives, in Washington.

He spent the morning calling on Nebraska representatives in the house and senate and in the afternoon played golf with Secretary of Agriculture Wallace. He left tonight for New York where he will confer with Architect Goodhue relative to the specifications for the superstructure of the new capitol building.

Steel Corporation Report Optimistic

New York, April 25.—Slow but certain recovery from the extreme depression of 1921 in the steel and iron industry, was indicated by the statement of the United States Steel corporation for the first quarter of the current year issued today.

Not all of the preferred dividend for that period was earned and the directors had to take \$6,794,468 from the undivided surplus to meet the \$12,658,700 required to pay the regular dividends on the preferred and common shares.

Total earnings of \$19,339,985 compared with \$19,612,033 in the previous quarter, and net income of \$10,975,696, was less by \$346,316, leaving a balance applicable to dividends of \$1,339,985.

The encouraging features of the statement are contained in the monthly operations. Earnings for January were below those of last December, but February showed a substantial recovery, and March improved by almost 40 per cent over the previous month.

Chairman Elbert H. Gary announced the election of W. J. Fibert, comptroller of the corporation and a member of the board of directors, to membership on the finance committee, the late George W. Perkins, and of E. J. Buffington, president of the Illinois Steel company, as director to replace Mr. Perkins.

N. Y. Federal Reserve Bank Income in '21 Shows Slump

New York, April 25.—Net income of the Federal Reserve bank of New York in 1921 was more than 50 per cent less than that of the preceding year.

The annual report of the bank, made public today, shows net income of \$26,093,832 in 1921, compared with \$53,128,130 in 1920.

The reduction in the gross income of the bank from \$40,525,000 in 1920 to \$34,705,000 in 1921, the report says, "is attributable to a reduction during 1921 of 63 per cent in the bank's earning assets, accompanied by successive reductions in the discount rates from 7 per cent to 4 1/2 per cent."

Two factors contributed, the report explains, to a steady decline of reserve bank loans in 1921. The first was a reduction in the credit requirements of agriculture and business, resulting from a lessened business activity, and the second was a net importation of \$667,000,000 in gold during 1921, most of which found its way into the federal reserve system through the local bank.

Hart, secretary of the department of trade and commerce, stated today. A sum of \$16,368 was received from Valparaiso and \$15,112 from Pleasanton.
