THE GOOD WILL DELEGATION Will Be Recorded in History

The Omaha Bee, co-operating with the American Committee for Devastated France, offers a number of women, resident in Nebraska and Iowa, the honor and distinction of representing this section in the Good Will Delegation to France, which will sail from New York July Twenty-second.

The delegation, including approximately one hundred women of leading American cities, each elected by popular vote, will be officially received by the French Government and will travel under the auspices of The American Committee for Devastated France, of which Miss Anne Morgan is Chairman. Nominations have been made of women to whom we can safely trust the honor of representing this section.

Members of the delegation will be escorted by capable guides and accompanied by a corps of interpreters. After official reception in Paris they will be conducted through the devastated areas and shown just what difficulties confront the people of France who were driven from their homes and just how the money donated in America is being used to assist the people to return to their former homes and to again produce wealth from the soil.


Following this trip they will tour the beautiful parts of France in Normandy and Brittany and return to Paris for eight days of receptions, sightseeing and pleasure as joint guests of the French Government, The American Committee for Devastated France, The Omaha Bee and other co-operating American newspapers as well as the press of Paris.

TO CARRY FUNDS FOR MEMORIAL

The delegation will carry to France an offering from the people of America to the people of France as an expression of Good Will between the two Republics. The fund will be used to complete the work of The American Committee which undertook, immediately after the armistice, the work of assisting in the reconstruction of four cantons in France. The small section of northern France, in which the American Committee is doing its work, will become a perpetual, living memorial of the age-old friendship which has always existed between the French and American people.

Until such time as the fields of northern France can again be made to produce crops, the bare necessities of sustaining life must be a matter of charity. When harvests can be reaped wealth will be produced from the soil and the French people can again become a purchasing power in the markets of the world.

Not the least of the lasting benefits is the introduction of American methods and American machinery into this section in connection with the intensive cultivation of the soil which has always been characteristic.
