

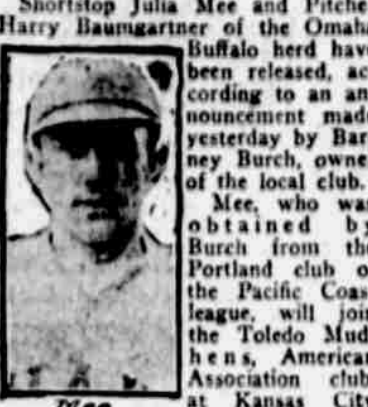
Boston Red Sox Blank Senators by 8 to 0 Score
