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Gilder Paintings Exhibited at the Library

In the southeast room at the Omaha Society of Fine Arts' museum in the Public Library now hangs a collection of paintings by Robert F. Gilder. They are nearly 100 desert scenes painted while the artist was in Arizona the past winter. During the winter Mr. Gilder exhibited at the Woman's club, Tucson, Ariz., 36 of the paintings here shown and three others which were purchased by Mrs. Ellen B. Spofford of New York City. A large canvas of the desert was sold to an Arizona ranchman.

Besides this large output, Mr. Gilder was active along archeologic lines in the south, and although not on the program was asked to and did deliver an address to the southwest branch of the American Association for the Advancement of Science,

which held its sessions at the University of Tucson, Ariz., in the desert, were found most interesting to Dr. Gilder, and when eight inches of snow fell, covering semi-tropical verdure, Mr. Gilder amazed the natives by painting a snow picture sitting under the shade of a cactus.

Last Word in Vases

The flower lover has a variety of good vases from which to choose this season. If her taste runs toward Tiffany ware she may find slender bud vases of gold glass with hand-enameled vases; if she wishes a bowl for numerous flowers there are gold glass bowls for them also.

The famous Rookwood ware made from clay from Ohio valley, which furnishes beautiful pottery molded by community workers in Ohio river towns, can be had in either dull or glazed finishes. The shops have lovely apple green porcelain bowls, with flower holders to correspond with them. If one wishes a hand-painted vase, there are many to choose from. Some deep blue bowl with cerulean

lining it may be had also. Then there are those pottery vases with tulip borders that have very graceful lines if one wishes a taller vase. English wedgewood is always classy. Black basalt vases with grape vine designs are works of art; the Queen Sevre comes some cheaper. Flower holders with bird center ornaments come with these wedgewood vases. These vases are just the thing for roses and are very fine with polished oak woodwork. They may be had in soft blues and greys, greens, as well as black.

If one cares to be extravagant, you may invest in Sevres ware, computes with statuettes bases, or flower bowls with French gold mountings may be had at handsome sums.

If you need inexpensive vases, choose a bud vase. Many of these single bud vases are slender and of good form. They are very dainty and may grace a small table, writing desk or mantel. We Americans have learned to use bud vases from the Japanese, but sometimes we forget the artistic

orientals and revel in a bowl of nasturtiums or cherry blossoms. We feel that some flowers should be in bowls in masses, while others are so delicate that a fragile vase seems quite the one to use. The flower holders, statuettes, birds and lily pads are a decided improvement in arranging, as they permit the flowers to choose pleasant angles and at the same time support the stems. One can almost imagine that flowers grow from the bottom of the bowl, as the ends of stems are invisible.
