Stymie Restored in Western Golf

Transmissippi Only Association Which Now Conflicting Rule.

Chicago, May 14.—The much discussed stymie in golf play was restored yesterday by the Western Golf association after several years of omission, in order to have uniformity of golf rules throughout the world and to lay the basis for an international committee on rules and regulations of the game to replace the present plan of adhering to or rejecting one of the two codes of the Royal and Ancient Golf club of St. Andrews.

The revolutionary action of the W. G. A. five years ago in abolishing the stymie has caused considerable turmoil in golf since then. The trade against the stymie, one of the least used plays in the game, arising only when in match play, a player's ball lies directly in the line of his opponent's putt, and more than six inches from the opponent's ball on the putting green, spread widely and induced the United States Golf association to modify the play and finally to make a rule that virtually annulled it. The Transmissippi Golf association made still another play, creating a stymie only when the player stymied himself, and that is the only conflicting rule now extant.

Western Association Tabooes Intercollegiate Contests of Co-Eds. Eugene, Ore., May 14.—Intercollegiate athletic contests between women in colleges and universities, affiliated with the Western Association of College Women are to be discouraged by the organization and any institution failing to abide by the ruling will be dropped from the membership.
