

Stymie Restored

Transmissippi Only Association Which Now Has Conflicting Rule.

Chicago, May 14.—The much dis-cussed stymie in golf play was re-stored yesterday by the Western Golf association after several years of abolition, in order to have uniformity of golf rules throughout the world and to lay the basis for an international committee on rules and reg-plations of the game to replace the present plan of adhering to or rebelling from the tenets laid down by the Royal and Ancient Golf club of St. Andrews.

The revolutionary action of the W. G. A. five years ago in abolishing the stymic has caused sonsiderable turmoil in golfdo mever since. The tirade against the stymie, one of the least used plays in the game, arising only when in match play, a player's ball lies directly in the line of his opponent's putt, and more than six inches from the opponent's ball on the putting green, spread until the furore induced the United States Golf association to modify the play and finally to make a rule that virtually annulled it. The Transmissisippi Golf asociation made still another rule, creating a stymic only when the player stymied himself, and that is the only conflicting rule now
