

### Love and Studies Can't Be Mixed, Say Professors

Lovers Should Quit School if They Decide to Marry, Asserts Northwestern Dean.

Chicago, June 2.—Love, especially the unwieldy variety, is too much for the victims to attempt it and study at the same time, declare authorities at Northwestern university and the University of Chicago. They uphold the action of the University of Wisconsin in expelling two students who were married secretly.

"Love is one thing—study another. Roy C. Flickinger, dean of the College of Liberal Arts at Northwestern, summarized his views. "Love exacts all a person's thoughts. It is the most exacting mental process known."

"If a young man student falls in love with a co-ed, both should quit school until they are married. And they should wait until they have outgrown their honeymoon before they return to school."

David A. Robertson, dean of the University of Chicago, echoes the stand against campus marriages. "We can't do anything with them," he said, "and they're better off making a home than spooning around the campus. Any time our young people get so deeply in love that they feel they must marry, they are so thoroughly out of sympathy with the classroom atmosphere that we don't need them."

Both deans were careful to explain their theories did not hold for couples who were already married. These couples have become so acclimated to marriage that they can devote the necessary time to their studies, they declare.

### Litchfield Farmer Tops Cattle Market in Omaha

P. M. Peck came in from Litchfield to the Omaha livestock market with a mixed load of cattle. Fourteen head of the consignment averaged 1,220 pounds and were sold at the top price of the day, \$8.75 a hundred.

Mr. Peck said there was a scarcity of stock cattle around Litchfield and that good pasture could be got for \$1 a head per month, while two years ago owners were hunting for pastures and paying \$2 a head per month.

### Range Lamb Shortage Predicted by Roberts

Beet Roberts, representative of the South Omaha Stockyards company, who has been on a trip to the Pacific coast, says most of the California lambs raised for shipment to eastern points have been sent out this season and that the number was about the same as last year.

"From what I observed on my trip," said Mr. Roberts, "there will be a great shortage in range lamb next season, in fact a larger shortage than that forecast by the government. The hard winter in Utah caused a heavy loss of ewes and the lamb crop will be only about 60 per cent of the average."

"The flocks in southern Wyoming were hard hit by the storm of May 10, and I was told that over 25,000 aged sheep were killed, as well as hundreds of cattle. The sheep production in Wyoming will show a decided falling off this fall, and it is predicted the shortage will amount to 50 per cent."
