Even a more doltish brute than "Yank" would see futility of his proceeding as he did. What may be said "The Hairy Ape" is that it typifies the blind struggle of humanity against conditions that bind it to its destiny. "Yank" is the symbol of those masses who are not happy because of their situation; his death the inevitable result of the way he chose in his blindness. The path from the stokehold to the upper deck is a long one, but it is also a plain one. The distance will not besecret; Lyoff Tolstoi showed the teach a mujik to live like a nobleman. 
