Manager Ed Church of the Lansing and a part of the original Griffith's "Faust" company returned home Tuesday.

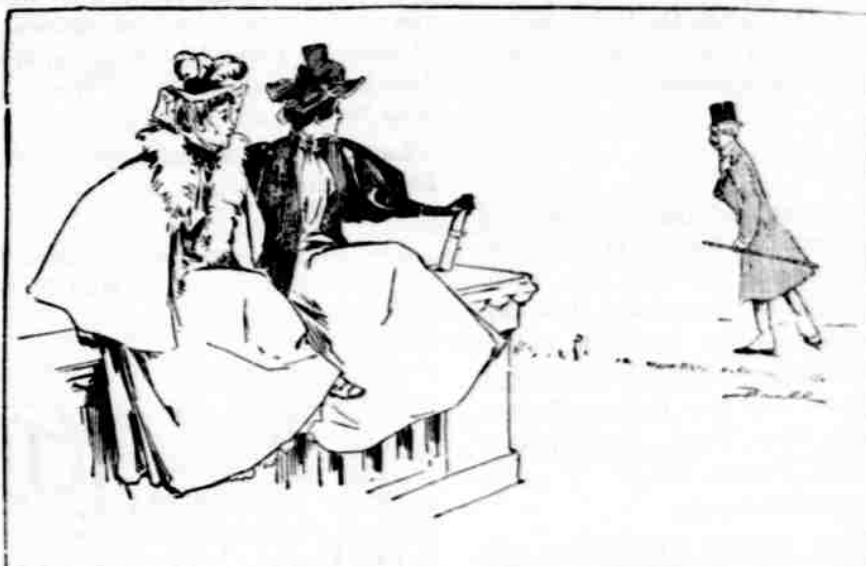
The English club of the state university held a very enjoyable meeting at the home of Miss Preyton Saturday evening.

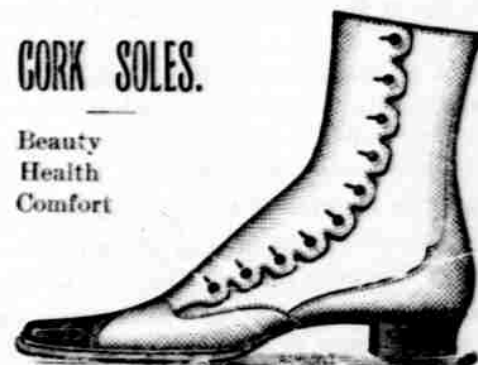
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
