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
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#### POINTS IN POLITICS

When the executive committee of the Nebraska league of republican clubs turned down Mr. Rosewater's application for a place on the delegation from this state to the national republican league convention held in Cleveland last year, there were some republicans who thought that action not justified. They claimed that while Mr. Rosewater had opposed some republican candidates he was still a republican. In the campaign in Douglas county he opposed every republican candidate, men against whom there could be no possible objection, It is gratifying to know that at least one body of republicans in Nebraska had the independence to stand out against this man who has on almost every occasion exerted himself to secure the defeat of the republican ticket.
