The meeting of the city federation of Women's Christian associations brought out a goodly number of ladies yesterday afternoon. Mrs. Ricketts, president of the federation presided. Mrs. Thomas Sewell conducted the opening singing. Mrs. Ricketts read from the scriptures and made appropriate comments. Mesdames Rachel Hyde and F. M. Hall led in prayer.

Mrs. M. D. Welch was made temporary secretary.

Mrs. L. C. Richards explained that an effort was being made to take the home for the friendless and Milford home out of the hands of the women's board and moved that one woman be appointed from the federation to act with a committee appointed by similar organizations to take such action as seemed best and confer with the legislature. The motion carried and Mrs. M. D. Welch was appointed.

Reports given by committees were very favorable and showed the financial condition to be quite good in every department of work. The treasurer reported a balance of \$412.06 on hand. Mrs. Clark announced that \$191.62 was to be found in the treasury of the home department. She gave a careful, detailed statement.

Affairs at the transient home were reported by Mrs. S. D. Hyde. Forty-five visits had been made to the depot; six guests had been entertained at the home; seven had been met at the train and sent on to their destinations.

Mrs. J. R. Webster stated that there was now no patient at the hospital. She also told of some offers made by Rev. H. Heiner.

Miss Laura Wild said that the educational department had had 248 calls, served 892 lunches, had in classes eighty-nine, at Sunday service 136, eighteen applications for work, and thirteen for help.

Miss Elizabeth Irwin reported the finances of the same department she had received \$32.43, and paid out \$198.91.

A good report of the Friday evening entertainment made by Mrs. C. E. Sanderson was read by Miss Wild.

Announcement was made that Miss Rosa Bouten's lectures on domestic economy had been postponed until twelve ladies signify their desire to attend them.

Special singing is provided at the devotional meetings. After these services tea is served so that girls coming from a distance can stay until church time.

The committee on formulating plans for a primary Sunday school training class had held a meeting and had called a meeting of superintendents and one delegate from each church for next Tuesday evening at 7:30 in the Y. M. C. A. rooms.
