The Boston Public Library Pictures

The collection of Copley prints at the university is now displayed in Miss Parker's studio instead of in the art gallery. They are reproductions of the work of Elwin A. Abbey, E. H. Blashfield, Robert Blum, Puvis de Chavannes, John La Farge, Frederick Macmonnies, John S. Sargent, Elihu Vedder and others, which hang on the walls of the Boston public library. The platinum process by which these great works are produced with such fidelity, retains the technique of the original. It is difficult to believe on first examination that they are not guache copies by a good artist of a greater one's work. The photographs are for sale and they are most desirable. Mechanical reproduction can go no further in retaining the soft tone of the original than in these prints, Abbey's The Round Table of King Arthur was seen by a great number at the world's fair. I get a better impression of the fresco in the copy because the original is so immense that the eye can only take in the detail and the inexpressible beauty and meaning of the composition as a whole is lost.

This collection gives one a new idea of the vigor, fertility, and genius of American artists. In another decade they will certainly lead the world.
