MUSICAL MENTION

The following is a critique from the Omaha World-Herald and concerns a concert in which some Lincoln singers participated.

"One fault the paragrapher finds with church concerts when the promoters put their shoulders to the wheels is a fact that such a long list of clever performers are gathered together, and when it is over, one's mind is a mass of conflicting tones and a critique is well nigh impossible. This was apparent on Friday evening at the Lowe Avenue Presbyterian church, when a musical and literary entertainment was given under the auspices of the Ladies' Aid society.

Mrs. David A. Campbell of Lincoln, fresh from her European conquests, was the leadstone of attraction. Her incomparable voice filled the church with the sweetest harmony and carried one above the sordid matters of every day life. The softness of her tones and her shading were really wonderful, and those who came afterward had a herculean task in their bid for appreciation, but the audience was in receptive mood, and while it doubtless carried away remembrance of Mrs. Campbell it did not fail in its appreciation of the other numbers on the program.

Mrs. Charles S. Lippincott, the foremost soprano of Lincoln, did some excellent work. Mrs. J. I. Cook created a decided impression in her rendering of the "Sands o' Dee." Miss Getty followed Mrs. Campbell with a couple, and by her superb singing righted the audience that had not yet recovered from the effects of Mrs. Campbell's solo. Mr. W. H. Wilbur was on the program for the second number of the second part of the program, but at the request of Mrs. Lippincott, changed places with her and took the fifth number. It was a dangerous thing to do, as that gentleman had not been heard and the audience was getting tired, it being very close to 11 o'clock when his number was reached, but the substitution proved fortunate, and Mr. Wilbur must be credited with one of the most appreciable numbers on the program. Dr. R. W. Bailey sang very well in fact it is seldom that he has ever done better. Miss Clara Hawley, one of the best pianists in the city, Mr. J. I. Cook and Mrs. Jessie Brown Dorward, the elocutionist, relieved the program of any possible monotony.

Prof. Tucker of Glenwood and Miss Nettie Haverly were the accompanists of the evening and did much to make the concert enjoyable. Miss Clara Blumer, Mrs. Zimmer and Mrs. Rose Macumber also lent valuable assistance.
