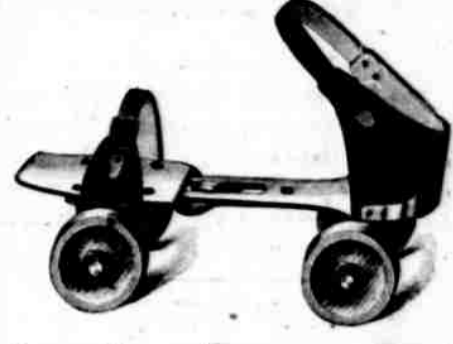
The May Festival.
